





Climate Impacts in CA/Marin













Social Inequities Climate Impacts






Climate justice connects the climate crisis to the social, racial and environmental issues in which it is deeply entangled.



Unprecedented public funding opportunities

Over the past 2 years, we have seen historic investment in federal climate spending. Over the next decade, spending on climate will more than triple historic levels

2. Expand and amplify **climate justice advocacy** at the local, regional, state and federal levels




3. Catalyze climate action through **partnerships**, **collaboratives**, and **coalitions**

Of Particular Interest for the CJI Spring 2024 Cycle

- Support the prioritization of community-scale climate resilience projects.
- Increase the **organizational capacity** of community-based organizations working to increase equitable climate resilience.
- Bolster local government's capacity to resource, plan, and implement equitable climate resilience projects.
- Provide economic benefits through green workforce training opportunities toward sustainable wage jobs and through cost savings from climate-related incentives.



What are MCF's Priority Communities?

Certain communities in Marin County are most impacted by social and economic inequities due to race, income level, gender, identity, religion, immigration status, disability, age, sexual orientation or zip code.

Data shows these populations are largely concentrated in **four geographic areas**:

- the Canal neighborhood of San Rafael
- Marin City
- Novato
- West Marin

Populations experiencing these inequities also reside in other parts of the county. We welcome proposals that are advancing equity and are working outside of these four geographic areas.



Important Dates and Deadlines



Funding Guidelines Released: February 15, 2024

Online Information Session: February 27, 2024, 1-2 pm

Proposals due: Wednesday, March 20, 2024, close of business

Funding decisions announced: late May, 2024

Grant Start Date: June 1, 2024



Who can apply?



- **501(c)3 nonprofit** organizations
- Projects that are fiscally sponsored by a 501(c)3 organization
- Public agencies or jurisdictions.

The proposed project must be **based in Marin.** In the case of advocacy and coalition requests that have a larger regional footprint, the proposal must directly benefit Marin County and MCF's priority communities.

An organization can apply as part of a collaborative, as well as submit a separate proposal as a stand-alone entity.



What Makes a Proposal Competitive?



The strongest proposals will align with CJI's Guiding Principles, Climate Resilience definitions, Spring 2024 Key Priorities, and the Selection Criteria listed in the RFP:

- Demonstrated Commitment to equity.
- Alignment between the climate change project being pursued, your organizational/agency goals, and your community's needs.
- **Use a Systems Change approach:** Policy, Systems, or Environmental (PSE) approaches to address barriers to progress on equitable climate resilience.



What Expenses are Allowed?

- Personnel (staff and contractor) costs associated with the project;
- Community engagement expenses;
- Equipment and supplies directly related to the project;
- Direct and indirect costs and 10-25% overhead.



What are the Funding Parameters?

- For single applicants: \$80,000-\$150,000 per year.
- For collaborative applications, the maximum amount requested is capped at \$30,000 per organization and up to \$100,000 for the lead entity, per year.
- The requested grant period may range from 12-24 months.
- Approximately 15-20 awards are expected to be made in this cycle.



Anticipated Outcomes – Non-Exhaustive

- Organizations will build their internal capacity to lead and participate in climate resilience planning, processes and projects, and to engage in coordinated climate policy advocacy.
- New public and private climate funding will be leveraged for priority communities based on the success of MCF-funded projects.
- More residents from marginalized communities will have opportunities to engage meaningfully on climate resilience issues at a local or state level, and to reap economic benefits from climate investments.
- Community-based efforts to increase climate resilience will make significant progress toward their stated goals. Specific milestones will be determined by project leaders.



Grantee Learning Cohort

- MCF will design a **9-month Community of Practice** with curated technical assistance offerings and collective learning opportunities. We will be putting out a Consultant RFP to identify potential TA providers in the coming weeks.
- Project budgets may include staff time to participate in monthly cohort meetings of 2 3 hours plus an allotment of individual technical assistance hours, as part of your staff costs for the project.
- Consistent participation is expected by the executive director and/or senior program leader(s) who are directly involved in project implementation.

- Narrative Questions (9 required, 6 conditional)
- Organization Profile (Demographic Information)
- Project Budget showing both Income & Expenses Optional template provided on Project Budget Upload page.
- Organization Documents:
 - Signed MCF Non-Discrimination Policy Form
 - Financial statements (audited or unaudited)*
 - o IRS Form 990*
 - Most recent, board-approved, detailed organizational budget


